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The <u>Phoenix Art Museum</u> is only one of the host galleries exhibiting *Old Glory: The American Flag in Contemporary Art*, but it is here that controversy has arisen.

Although glowing reviews (Richard Nilsen's review appeared in the *Arizona Republic*, dated March 17, 1996) were extended following the show's March opening, at least two of the works in the show provoked protests by members of the American Legion and others, including Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich. Many articles and reports have appeared in the extensive media coverage of the controversy and debates that have followed.
